The Submission of His Service

"bowed himself" (2)
"your servant" (3,5)

The Solicitousness of His Service

Abraham expressed genuine care toward his guests by the things he offered them (3-5)

The Sacrifice of His Service

True service requires a willingness to sacrifice
"took a calf, tender and good" (7)

Compare Mal 1:13

The Steadfastness of His Service

"he stood by them under the tree while they ate"

The posture of a servant who is ever ready to do the bidding of his master

Ties in with Gen 17:26 "That very day Abraham and his son Ishmael..."

¹And **the LORD** appeared to him by the *oaks of Mamre*, as he sat at the door of his tent in the heat of the day.

Gen 13:18 "So Abram moved his tent and came and settled by the oaks of Mamre, which are at Hebron..."

²He lifted up his eyes and looked, and behold, **three men** were standing in front of him. When he saw them, **he ran** from the tent door to meet them and **bowed himself** to the earth

³and said, "O **Lord**, if I have found favor in your sight, do not pass by **your servant**.

⁴Let a little **water** be brought, and **wash your feet**, and **rest yourselves** under the tree,

⁵while I bring a **morsel of bread**, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to **your servant**." So they said, "Do as you have said."

⁶And Abraham **went quickly** into the tent to Sarah and said, "Quick! Three seahs of fine flour! Knead it, and make cakes."

⁷And **Abraham ran** to the herd and **took a calf, tender and good**, and gave it to a young man, who prepared it **quickly**.

In the Ancient Near East animal food is not usually provided, except for special visitors

⁸Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them. And **he stood by them under the tree while they ate**.

Who Were the Three Men?

***The LORD / Angels**

"**the LORD appeared**"
12:7, 17:1, 26:2, 24, 35:9

LORD (1) יְהוָה (YHWH)

Lord (3) אֱלֹהִים ('ădō·nāy)

Both are names for the one true God

Compare to "Angel of the **LORD**" in **Gen 16:7-12**

Gen 18:22 So the men turned from there and went toward Sodom, but Abraham still stood before the **LORD**.

Gen 19:1 The two angels came to Sodom in the evening, and Lot was sitting in the gate of Sodom.

Gen 19:12-13 Then the men said to Lot, "Have you anyone else here? Sons-in-law, sons, daughters, or anyone you have in the city, bring them out of the place.¹³ For we are about to destroy this place, because the outcry against its people has become great before the **LORD**, and the **LORD** has sent us to destroy it."

Gen 19:24 Then the **LORD** rained on Sodom and Gomorrah sulfur and fire from the **LORD** out of heaven.

Possibilities

1.) One man was the **LORD**, and the other two were simply angels

2.) All three represented the presence of the **LORD**

[LORD (1) יְהוָה (YHWH)]

¹⁰The **LORD** said, "I will surely return to you about this time next year, and Sarah your wife shall have a son." And Sarah was listening at the tent door behind him.

God repeats the promise he made to Abraham in Gen 17:15-21

¹¹Now **Abraham and Sarah were old**, advanced in years. The way of women had ceased to be with Sarah.

[Gen 11:30 "Now Sarai was barren; she had no child"]

¹²So **Sarah laughed to herself**, saying, "After I am worn out, and my lord is old, shall I have pleasure?"



Note the difference in God's reaction after Abraham laughed (17:15-21)

¹³The LORD said to Abraham, "**Why did Sarah laugh** and say, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, now that I am old?'

¹⁴**Is anything too hard for the LORD?** At the appointed time I will return to you, about this time next year, and **Sarah shall have a son.**"

¹⁵But **Sarah denied it**, saying, "**I did not laugh**," for she was afraid. He said, "No, but you did laugh."

LORD / Three Men

3378 יהוה (*ywhh*): n.pr.; ≡ Str 3068, 3069, 3070, 3071, 3072, 3073, 3074; TWOT 484a—LN 12.9 (true God) (njb) **Yahweh**: Jehovah, the Lord as an euphemism for *Adonai*, most versions the name of the one true God, with a focus on sure existence and His relationship to his covenant persons and peoples (Ex 3:15), see also 3363¹

151 אֲדֹנֵי ('ădō·nāy): n.pr.; ≡ Str 136; TWOT 27b—**1.** LN 12.1–12.42 (masc.) **Lord**, Master, i.e., a title of the true God with a focus on the authority and majesty of a ruler (Ge 18:27), see also 123; **2.** LN 12.1–12.42 unit: אֲדֹנֵי יהוה (‘ădō·nāy *yhw(h)*), יהוה (*ywhh*) Sovereign Lord, formally, Majestic Lord Yahweh, i.e., a title of the true God with a focus on the authority and majesty of a ruler, yet also implying a relationship based in promise, covenant, or other relational factors (Ge 15:2)²

Adonai (אֲדֹנֵי, *adonay*). A name belonging to God, which is translated “Lord.” Its vowels are found in the Masoretic Text with יהוה (*ywhh*) (YHWH). When the ancient Hebrew reader came to these letters, he/she always substituted in pronunciation the name “Adonai.”³

Him (v.1)

Genesis 17:26 (ESV)

²⁶ That very day Abraham and his son Ishmael were circumcised.

Oaks of Mamre

Mamre—manliness.

(1.) An Amoritish chief in alliance with Abraham (Gen. 14:13, 24).

(2.) The name of the place in the neighbourhood of Hebron (q.v.) where Abraham dwelt (Gen. 23:17, 19; 35:27); called also in Authorized Version (13:18) the “plain of Mamre,” but in Revised Version more correctly “the oaks [marg., ‘terebinth’] of Mamre.” The name probably denotes the “oak grove” or the “wood of Mamre,” thus designated after Abraham’s ally.

This “grove” must have been within sight of or “facing” Machpelah (q.v.). The site of Mamre has been identified with Ballatet Selta, i.e., “the oak of rest”, where there is a tree called “Abraham’s oak,” about a mile and a half west of Hebron. Others identify it with er-Rameh, 2 miles north of Hebron.⁴

Genesis 13:18 (ESV)

¹⁸ So Abram moved his tent and came and settled by the oaks of Mamre, which are at Hebron, and there he built an altar to the Lord.

Sacrifice of His Service

Abraham ran unto the herd, and fetched a calf—Animal food is never provided, except for visitors of a superior rank when a kid or lamb is killed. A calf is still a higher stretch of hospitality, and it would probably be cooked as is usually done when haste is required—either by roasting it whole or by cutting it up into small pieces and broiling them on skewers over the fire. It is always eaten along with boiled corn swimming in butter or melted fat, into which every morsel of meat, laid upon a piece of bread, is dipped, before being conveyed by the fingers to the mouth.⁵

Genesis 17:15–21 (ESV)

¹⁵ And God said to Abraham, “As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her name Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶ I will bless her, and moreover, I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall become nations; kings of peoples shall come from her.” ¹⁷ Then Abraham fell on his face and laughed and said to himself, “Shall a child be born to a man who is a hundred years old? Shall Sarah, who is ninety years old, bear a child?” ¹⁸ And Abraham said to God, “Oh that Ishmael might live before you!” ¹⁹ God said, “No, but Sarah your wife shall bear you a son, and you shall call his name Isaac. Power of God

Luke 1:26–38 (ESV)

²⁶ In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, ²⁷ to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. And the virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ And he came to her and said, "Greetings, O favored one, the Lord is with you!" ²⁹ But she was greatly troubled at the saying, and tried to discern what sort of greeting this might be. ³⁰ And the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹ And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. ³² He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. And the angel departed from her.
