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Approaching God is a Serious Matter

I Samuel 15:22 (ESV)

And Samuel said, "Has the LORD as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the LORD? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to listen than the fat of rams."

Proverbs 15:8

The sacrifice of the wicked is an abomination to the LORD, but the prayer of the upright is acceptable to him.

Hebrews 12:28-29 (ESV)

²⁸Therefore let us be grateful for receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, and thus let us offer to God acceptable worship, with reverence and awe, ²⁹for our God is a consuming fire.

How Does it Apply Today?

John 4:19-26

¹⁹The woman said to him, "Sir, I perceive that you are a prophet. ²⁰Our fathers worshiped on this mountain, but you say that in Jerusalem is the place where people ought to worship." ²¹Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. ²²You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. ²³But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship him. ²⁴God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." ²⁵The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming (he who is called Christ). When he comes, he will tell us all things." ²⁶Jesus said to her, "I who speak to you am he."

Listen First, Speak Second

James 1:19-21 (ESV)

¹⁹Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; ²⁰for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness that God requires. ²¹Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.

Words be Few

Matthew 6:7-13 (ESV)

Vow to God

Judges 11:30, 32, 34-35 (ESV)

³⁰And Jephthah made a vow to the Lord and said, "If you will give the Ammonites into my hand, ³¹then whatever comes out from the doors of my house to meet me when I return in peace from the Ammonites shall be the Lord's, and I will offer it up for a burnt offering." ³²So Jephthah crossed over to the Ammonites to fight against them, and the Lord gave them into his hand.

³⁴Then Jephthah came to his home at Mizpah. And behold, his daughter came out to meet him with tambourines and with dances. She was his only child; beside her he had neither son nor daughter. ³⁵And as soon as he saw her, he tore his clothes and said, "Alas, my daughter! - We recognize His Power (Majesty)
- We recognize His gift to us
- We recognize His right to our lives (Blood of Jesus)
- We seek guidance
- We see mercy (we recognize our failings)

Isaiah 40:28-31 (ESV)

²⁸Have you not known? Have you not heard? The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. ²⁹He gives power to the faint, and to him who has no might he increases strength. ³⁰Even youths shall faint and be weary, and young men shall fall exhausted; ³¹but they who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.

Ephesians 2:1-10 (ESV)

¹And you were dead in the trespasses and sins ²in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience-- ³among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind. ⁴But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, ⁵even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ--by grace you have been saved-- ⁶and raised us up with him and

I Samuel 1:12-15 (ESV)

¹²As she continued praying before the LORD, Eli observed her mouth. ¹³Hannah was speaking in her heart; only her lips moved, and her voice was not heard. Therefore Eli took her to be a drunken woman. ¹⁴And Eli said to her, ¹⁵"How long will you go on being drunk? Put away your wine from you." But Hannah answered, "No, my lord, I am a woman troubled in spirit. I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the LORD.

Luke 18:9-14 (ESV)

4. What happens when we lose our reverence for God?

- Going through the motions in worship (don't remember the details)
- Apathy
- Stop studying, stop praying
- Stop living sacrificially
- Divisions in the church

General Notes:

This chapter starts a change in style – moves from soliloquy to personal address (second person) / Verse 1 is the last verse of Chapter 4 in the Hebrew, Greek and Latin Bibles

Verse 1:

"Guard your steps" – "Keep thy foot" – KJV – Give your mind to what you are going to do – Approach God with seriousness, reverence and awe. Approaching God is not merely an outward observance or religious duties, but also includes a pattern of life honoring God's commandments?

What is the sacrifice of fools?

- When one approaches God (i.e. to worship) without regard to the proper understanding and intention of it.
- John 4:24 "God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth."

"Ready to Listen"

James 1:19-21

19Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; 20 for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness that God requires.
21Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.

Jesus may have had verse 1 in mind when he told the parable in Luke 18:9-14:

Verse 3:

Personal and business cares produce dreams (which are unsubstantial things)

Many times we approach God preoccupied with our own affairs. We are more "Important" than God.

Verse 4:

Hannah, Jonah and Jephthah are among those whose `vows' are mentioned in the Word of God.

Num. 6:1-21

Jonah 2:9 1 Sam. 1:19-28 Judg. 11:29-40

Jephthah is often cited as an example of one who made a rash vow; and Jonah's prayer indicates that he had made vows without paying them.

Christians today are not sinless in this matter of keeping our promises to God. Our very baptism is a holy vow to love and serve God through Jesus Christ; and any failure to do this falls under the condemnation cited here:

2 Pet. 2:20:22 -

...with reference to the Christian who, in a sense, vows to serve God in Christ, and then turns back, declares that it would have been far better for such a person, not to have known the way of righteousness. This is very nearly the same thing that is here stated with reference to the making of vows, i.e., that it would be far better not to vow than to vow and then not perform it.

The challenge that comes from scripture should be clinched by definite commitment.

Verse 7:

We should try to put ourselves in a position to discover God's way use what He has given us in our daily life.

In a word, this is the message of the whole paragraph. The worship and service of the holy and righteous God is no flippant or casual business. It is weighted with eternal meaning and significance. Furthermore, we must not write this paragraph off as some outmoded example of Old Testament harshness. The New Testament also even more urgently warns us in the same manner (Matt. 7:21ff; 23:16ff; and 1 Cor. 11:27ff). No amount of emphasis upon the grace of God can justify taking liberties with God. The very conception of grace demands gratitude; and gratitude can never be casual.
